Reflection

Portrait of Angela: Lead A New Life

Angela was a contemplative who sought and found God everywhere. What did "everywhere" mean to her? It meant long hours of prayer; it meant everywhere she had tasks to complete; it meant in every person she met.....in every service she offered according to needs and circumstances.

Pause

Angela gave her friendship with no thought of self. She gave it inclusively, simply, spontaneously, and she always came to the help of those most in need. Those who knew her learned from her what it meant to be "human," open to all and to the whole person, with healthy optimism and genuine love. The word she uses is *piacevolezza*, a lovableness that is attractive and pleasing.

Pause

Active and devoted laypeople found in her an inspiring leader. Reading and interpreting "the signs of the times," she was led by the Spirit to undertake an entirely new form of work, which evolved gradually as she moved forward step by step in response to the call of the Spirit.

All: Seize us with power and light to protect the earth and all of life, and so prepare for the coming of the Reign of God.

Reader: For what else shall we pray?

In Angela, you gave us a witness of patient and respectful care for all people. We ask you to transform our hearts and make them places where others feel at home. Teach us how to listen, help people find their way and grow in love and happiness. Amen.
